In years past, 50 to 60 tons of debris has been removed from the lake each year during this annual clean-up effort known as Beautification Day. Organized and conducted by the Leesville Lake Association, it spends \$40,000 to \$60,000 annually to remove debris from the lake under a contract with a local company.

This massive effort requires lots of volunteers and the financial support of many individual and business sponsors. This is the eighth consecutive year the Leesville Lake Association has dedicated a day to making Leesville Lake cleaner and safer. But that in fact is a goal of the Association every day.

"Take Pride in Leesville Lake" **Volunteer to Help** **Clean up on Beautification Day**

***If you boat, fish, ski or swim at Leesville Lake
you want it to be clean and safe.***

So all who use the lake are urged to help remove tree trunks, limbs and man-made debris from its surface and shoreline on Saturday, May 21, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Even if you don't have a boat or a shoreline your help is still needed. Come to a collection site and help off-load debris from boats, trucks and trailers.

Boat owners are asked to pickup or tow debris from the lake and take it to any of three collection sites: Brumfield boat ramp, Tri-County Marina or Runaway Bay boat ramp. Property owners who have a shoreline are asked also to pickup all debris from their shoreline and take it to a collection site.

The Leesville Lake Association has been very busy since our last news letter. Board members have been active either attending meetings in their area of responsibility or planing events or meetings to benefit our membership.

Currently we are gearing up for two very important events that you will not want to miss. The first is planned for Saturday morning, April 23rd. Is is called "Land & Lake-Scaping" and will begin at 8:30 a.m. at the Altavista Train Station. Experts from four organizations will be available to tell us the best way to preserve our shoreline and still comply with the shore line management plan. As good stewards of the lake we need to know how to best care for the shoreline. This is an opportunity to get free expert advice concerning appropriate trees, shrubs and vegetation for your lawn and lake areas.

The second big event is set for Saturday May 21st and is and opportunity for all members and friends of Leesville Lake to participate. This is our annual Lake Beautification Day. From 9:00 a.m.- 4:00 p.m. you will be able to collect debris from the lake and bring it to one of three collection sites, Brumfield Boat Ramp, Runaway Bay Boat Ramp and Tri-County Marina. Volunteer members will be there to help you off load your debris and it will be loaded by front-end loader into dumpsters. We hope to fill five 30 cubic yard Dumpsters. If you register to participate and let us know what T-Shirt sizes you will need for all who will be helping we will provide beautiful T-Shirts designed by our own Bob Rankin to each participant. In addition bottled water will also be available. When you register you may also register for the Thank You picnic which will be the next day at the Tri-County Marina starting at 2:00 p.m. You may bring a covered dish desert or salad and the Association will provide hot dogs, hamburgers and drinks. This is always a fun time to make a positive contribution to the lake and get to know some of your neighbors as well. There are a lot of really good people who live on or use our beautiful lake and it is exciting to get to know them better.

If you have not joined our association this would be a good time to join. After this news letter we will not be able to provide news letters to those who are not members.

Membership at only \$25.00 a year is one of the best buys in todays economy. We currently have about 350 member households. We would like to have closer to 600 members by the end of the year. It is that time of year again; the Leesville Lake Association is gearing up for its 8th Annual Leesville Lake Beautification Day to be held May 21st from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm with the last load of debris to be brought in not later than 3:30pm.

This is an event that the entire lake community can participate in. Debris is removed from the water and shoreline and brought to one of three locations around the lake for disposal.

Volunteer crews will be at each drop off location (Runaway Bay, Tri-County Marina, Brumfield) to receive, cut up and dump the wood and other debris into huge containers which will be removed by contractor and disposed of.

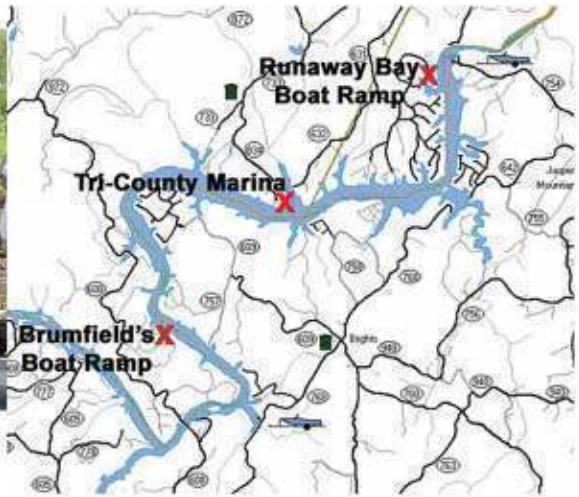
Last year 50 tons of debris was removed from the lake by volunteers on Beautification Day. We urge everyone who uses the lake or lives on or near the lake to come out and help remove logs, sticks, bottles, and other debris from the water and shoreline.

You may be aware that earlier this year a boater hit a log and did severe damage to his boat and motor, let's work hard to minimize the risk of this happening again. Appalachian Power Company (APCO) will have a crew working the Brumfield location to load trucks with debris via their conveyor belt.

I encourage you to sign up to help so please see the registration form and flyer in this newsletter or visit our web site for more information on how you can help by using your boat to haul debris to a drop off site or help at one of the drop off locations.

You can also help by simply cleaning up your own shoreline. Drop Off Locations

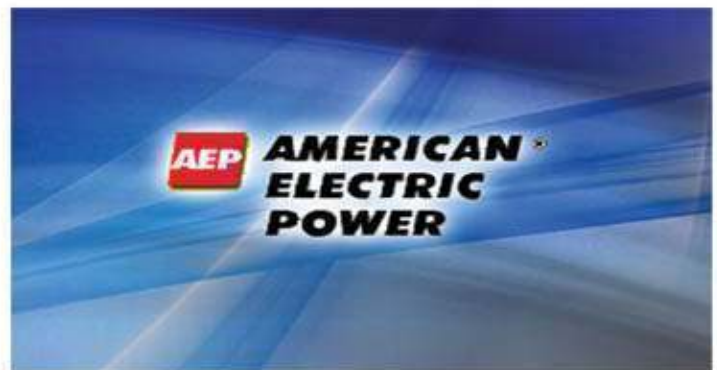

Appalachian Power Company's new operating license gives them principal responsibilities for debris removal at Smith Mountain Lake, and Leesville Lake the Tri-County Lake Administrative Commission (TLAC) continues to serve as a clearinghouse for debris issues.

Under the new license that went into effect in April 2010, APCo "shall remove, and properly dispose of debris from the project reservoirs that:

*Creates safety hazards
Interferes with public access to public recreation facilities, or
Results in adverse aesthetic impacts."*

Also, throughout the year, APCo must address recreational hazards created by floating debris resulting from high flow events.

After heavy rains earlier this month, APCo issued a news release reminding lake residents of a toll free number (1-800-956-4237) to use for reporting "floating and dangerous debris in navigable channels." Callers should be ready to give a description and location of the debris, APCo said.

TLAC Lake Coordinator Pam Dinkle said last week that her office continues to receive several inquiries about debris. "TLAC encourages residents to call us at 1-540-721-4400. As a service to the community, our staff will then call APCo on your behalf and we will track APCo's responsiveness to the report," Dinkle noted. TLAC website <http://www.sml.us.com>

Appalachian Power Company - PRESS RELEASE

ROCKY MOUNT, Va., March 15, 2011 – Recent heavy rains in Southwestern Virginia have washed natural and man-made debris into the two reservoirs of the Smith Mountain Hydroelectric Project and Appalachian Power is reminding area property owners of a relatively new centralized process for reporting areas of debris.

Residents of Smith Mountain and Leesville Lakes can call 1-800-956-4237 to report floating and dangerous debris in navigable channels. Callers should be ready to give a description and location of the debris. The Appalachian Power CSC is available to callers 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The number is the company's Customer Solutions Center (CSC) used by Appalachian Power's electricity customers.

An Appalachian CSC representative will take pertinent information from callers and forward it to the company's Hydro Generation Department where it will be tracked and handled in accordance with new operating license requirements and relevant management plans.

"The two lakes encompass more than 24,000 surface acres of water and about 600 miles of shoreline with many small coves," said Teresa Rogers, Appalachian process supervisor. "This phone-in process allows us to more easily track where debris has accumulated."

Not all debris will be removed by Appalachian. "Our priority is debris in the main channel that presents a boating hazard. Debris along the shoreline and in the back of coves outside of the main channel will be removed if it appears it could become a hazard to boating," Rogers said.

Debris that is considered wildlife habitat will not be removed. There will be times when debris blocks private docks where it is the responsibility of the owner to have it removed.

Boaters and others using lakes for recreational activities should be aware of floating debris, particularly after heavy local rains or upstream flooding and use safe boating practices and appropriate speed when on the water.

The new call-in process for the Smith Mountain Project went into effect in 2010.

For other lake-related issues, such as permit applications for in-water construction, shoreline vegetation work or questions regarding the Shoreline Management Plan, residents or businesses should continue to contact the Appalachian Hydro office in Rocky Mount at 540-489-2556.

Water Quality Monitoring

The Association had another successful water monitoring year in 2010. Our partnership with Lynchburg College allowed us to collect more data than in prior years. All of the data was uploaded to the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality database by the end of February and reports were distributed in early March.

The total phosphorus, chlorophyll a and Secchi depth data indicate that the lake is eutrophic. That is consistent with prior year data. The promotion of growth by nutrients is called eutrophication and is a natural aging process of lakes.

Eutrophication is unnaturally accelerated by too many nutrients. Nutrients can come from many sources including fertilizers applied to agricultural areas and lawns, erosion of soil containing nutrients and sewage discharges. Nutrients promote growth of microscopic plant cells (phytoplankton) that are fed upon by microscopic animals (zooplankton). As nutrients increase, the plants and animals increase and the water gets cloudier.

One of the goals of our water monitoring program is to establish a baseline of the nutrients in the water as well as obtain a better understanding of the phytoplankton and zooplankton in the lake. Data on dissolved oxygen, temperature and pH were consistent with prior years and none of the data exceeded state standards.

None of the lake water samples exceeded the state standard for E. coli, but two Pigg River samples did exceed the standard. If you would like a copy of the 2010 water quality monitoring report, please send me an email: malobue@gmail.com

It's The Law! Reminder of Boating Laws that could affect you!

On Leesville Lake,
there are 5 recognized No Wake Zones:

Runaway Bay (All Coves),
Pit Stop Marina,

Tri-County Marina (entire cove),
Staunton View Farms and

The ENTIRE LENGTH of Old Woman's Creek are
No Wake areas



Speed Laws - From the DGIF website:

"No Wake"

1. "No wake" is defined as the slowest possible speed required to maintain steerage and headway.
2. It shall be unlawful to operate any motorboat greater than no wake speed when within 50 feet or less of docks, piers, boathouses, boat ramps, and people in the water. This definition does not prohibit the pulling of a skier with a rope of less than 50 feet.

Slacken Speed

Operators shall reduce speed to avoid endangering persons or property by the effect of the motorboat's wake when approaching or passing vessels under way, lying to, at anchor, or made fast to the shore; or, when approaching or passing piers, docks, or boathouses; or when approaching or passing persons in the water or using water skis or surfboards.

Safe Speed

A safe speed is a speed less than the maximum at which the operator can take proper and effective action to avoid collision and stop within a distance appropriate to the prevailing circumstances and conditions.

In establishing a safe operating speed, the operator shall take into account: visibility, traffic density, ability to maneuver the vessel (stopping distance and turning ability), background light at night, proximity of navigational hazards, draft of the vessel, limitations of radar equipment, and the state of wind, sea, and current.

State regulations state that:



No one under the age of 14 may operate a personal water craft in Virginia;

It is unlawful for a person who owns or has charge of a personal water craft to knowingly permit a person under the age of 14 years to operate a personal water craft;

Personal water craft operators between the ages of 14 and 35 must have passed a qualified boating safety education course and must have the certificate of completion in his or her possession when operating. (This regulation became effective July 1, 2010.);

Personal water craft operators between the ages of 36 and 50 must meet these requirements by July 1, 2011; All motorboat operators age 20 and younger must meet these requirements by July 1 of this year;

Motorboat and personal water craft operators must obey "No Wake" signs by slowing their speed to no greater than that required to maintain steerage and headway.

Alcohol, Drugs, and Reckless Operation



Virginia law prohibits the operation of a boat by an operator with blood alcohol concentrations of .08 percent or more by weight, by volume.

"Implied Consent" states that by operating a boat, the operator is agreeing to submit to a breath and/or blood test to determine the amount of alcohol and/or drugs in your blood.

"Zero Tolerance" prohibits persons younger than 21 from consuming alcohol and operating a watercraft with any measurable alcohol level.

Boaters should never boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Designate an operator or leave the alcohol on shore.

Obey the laws, respect others rights, and practice safe boating etiquette and we can all enjoy the lake together.

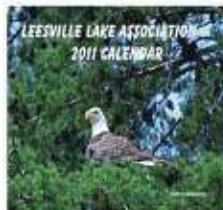

Free, courtesy Vessel Safety Checks of boats will be available on Saturday, May 21, at the Tri-County Marina dock from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

They will be done by a registered member of the United States Power Squadron.

The checks are not a boarding or law enforcement act; no citations will be issued. Rather, they are an evaluation that will let you know whether your vessel is "ship shape." You'll receive a copy of the evaluation so you can follow-up on the suggestions given.

Respondents said there are three "most important things" the Association do. Nearly 75% said continue to apply pressure on APCO to remove debris from the lake. Nearly 30% said continue to monitor the lakes' water quality. And about 10% said either promote safe boating or ensure proper management, protection and improvement of the lake's shoreline. Fourteen other "most important things" were mentioned two or fewer time.

Board members have been charged to analyze the results and present recommendations at the Board's May meeting.
